HAWK SEASON PREVIEW

SUMMARY

As the 2024-2025 collegiate basketball season approaches, the University of Maryland Eastern Shore men's basketball team will have an entirely new look come opening night. After going 9-20 (4-10) last season, UMES begins a new era as the Hawks enter their first season under new head coach Cleo Hill Jr.

ABOUT THE COACH

Hired in June, Coach Hill came to UMES after a successful tenure at Winston Salem State. Developing WSSU into a perennial CIAA power, Hill's six seasons as the head man of the Rams produced a winning percentage of .640 while claiming two CIAA tournament titles, two CIAA regular season titles and multiple division titles. With 17 years of head coaching experience, Hill has accumulated 261 combined victories which includes his time at WSSU as well as Shaw and Cheyney.

ALL NEW LOOK

With a completely new coaching staff which includes assistants Lance Beckwith, Chuck Ellis and Delorian Heard comes a completely re-vamped roster. UMES enters the season with 13 new players comprised of three freshman, six juniors, one senior and three graduate students.

PLAYING TOP LEVEL COMPETITION

The Hawks have constructed a schedule which is considered to be one of the toughest non-conference schedules of any school in the MEAC. UMES opens the season at SEC opponent Vanderbilt on Monday followed by a trip to Ivy League team UPenn on Thursday. In addition to the high-level competition to open the season, UMES wraps up the month of November with the Turkey Throwdown which includes games at Illinois (Big Ten) and Arkansas (SEC) before ending the month at defending national champion UConn on the 30th. UMES also has a marquee matchup to end non-conference play on December 28th at Maryland (Big Ten).

MEAC play begins on January 4 against defending regular season champion Norfolk State.

MEAC PROJECTIONS

Defending MEAC tournament champion Howard picked up 12 first-place votes in being named the preseason favorite, while the Spartans of Norfolk State were picked to finish second receiving three first-place votes. North Carolina Central and Morgan State were picked to finish third and fourth, respectively.

South Carolina State and Delaware State tied for fifth, with Maryland Eastern Shore and Coppin State rounding out the predicted order of finish.

LANCE THE CHAMP

At the annual "Hawk Hysteria" basketball pep rally, Assistant Coach Lance Beckwith won the 3-point contest. This continues a tradition he had at Winston Salem State, in which he faces off against students in a 3-point shootout every single season.

TWO NEW MEN'S BASKETBALL HALL OF FAMERS

A pair of Hawks have been inducted into the 2024 Class of the Athletic Hall of Fame.

Dominique Elliott, a post player from Savannah, Georgia, garnered a pair of All-American honors from College Court Report and BoxToRow Sports after an impressive senior campaign during the 2015-2016 season. Elliott averaged 14.8 points, 8.0 rebounds and shot 54 percent from the field as a senior - good for third on the all-time single season list for the Hawks. He led or tied for the team lead in rebounds in 24 of 32 games that season. In addition to his All-American honors, Elliott was named to the MEAC First Team, NABC All-District Team and was two time MEAC Player of the Week.

A transfer from Trinity Valley Community College, Elliott made an immediate impact as a junior at UMES averaging 7.1 points and 4.5 rebounds per game while earning MEAC Third Team honors.

After UMES, Elliott went on to a successful playing career overseas which included championships in Slovenia, Switzerland, Iceland, Macedonia, Estonia and Georgia. Elliott earned multiple honors throughout his professional career including 1st Team All Domestic honors before retiring in 2022.

Ed Tyson, a 6-2 guard from Baltimore, Maryland, proved to be a prolific scorer for the Hawks in the mid-2000s. As a freshman at UMES, Tyson averaged 9.6 points, 3.0 rebounds and 1.9 assists per contest while earning MEAC All-Rookie Team honors.

He went on to start in all 31 games the following season while leading the team with 16.4 points per game which included a season-high 37 points against South Carolina State. He also tallied with 4.3 rebounds and 1.7 assists per game to earning All-MEAC honors. In his final season with the Hawks, Tyson eclipsed 1000 career points while averaging a conference best 20.2 points per game. He also led UMES with 54 steals. His 646 total points during the 2007-2008 campaign ranked him second in school history for points in a single season behind Ken "Chick" Simmons (669 in 1978).

OTHER HAWK SPORTS FACTS

The UMES women's bowling team in the first HBCU to win a women's NCAA Collegiate national title (2007). The Hawks are the reigning MEAC Champs

While the school has not fielded a football team since the 1970s, UMES has a rich tradition in football with notable alums including NFL Hall of Famer Art Shell and Jets great Emerson Boozer. NFL greats Shell and Johnny Sample were also on the Hawk basketball team during their time as students.

The 1973-74 Hawks men's basketball team were the last UMES hoops squad to win a MEAC title. They were an amazing 27-2 and had the nation's top offense averaging 97.6 ppg. They were the first HBCU to play in the NIT and win an NIT game.

50th ANNIVERSARY OF THE 1973-1974 MEN'S BASKETBALL SQUAD

The 1973-1974 University of Maryland Eastern Shore men's basketball team celebrates 50 years in commemoration of their history making season. The Hawks went 27-2 during the 1973-74 campaign while setting records and breaking down racial barriers during that time by becoming the first HBCU basketball team to receive an invitation to the NIT Tournament – considered to be the premier college basketball tournament during that era.

Maryland Eastern Shore's offense gained national attention throughout the year. Under the direction of head coach John Bates with top scorers Rubin Collins, Joe Pace, Talvin Skinner, Billy Gordon and Tyrone Johnson running the floor, the Hawks had one of the most lethal scoring attacks the game has ever seen.

UMES finished with the nation's second-best offense that season, scoring an average of 93.3 points per-game - 13 years before college basketball adopted the three-point shot.

The Hawks won their first 20 games and were ranked No. 20 in the AP poll. Their only loss of the regular season came against a high powered Morgan State team led by eventual NBA veteran Marvin Webster. The Hawks avenged their loss to the Bear a few weeks later by downing MSU by 15 points for the MEAC crown.

UMES went on to win their opening round in the NIT by beating Manhattan, 84-81, in Madison Square Garden before losing by a slim two points to Jacksonville in the the second round of the tournament.

Collins, the team's leading scorer at 17.8 points per game, was drafted by the Portland Trailblazers. Skinner, who averaged a double-double for UMES, went on to be drafted by the Seattle Supersonics. Gordon was also later drafted by Seattle. Pace went on to play with the Washington Bullets and later won an NBA title.

The entire 12-man roster from 1973-74 was inducted into the UMES Athletics Hall of Fame in 2004.

THE SCORE

University of Maryland Eastern Shore Hawks - 81
North Carolina Central Eagles - 87

HOW IT HAPPENED

The Hawks hit on their first two field goals of the contest while NCCU knocked down two shots from the same spot in the corner in the early minutes of the game. Dionte Johnson made a three before the first media timeout to give the Hawks an early 9-5 lead. Baskets by Chace Davis, Troy Hupstead and Devon Ellis off the bench kept the Hawks ahead 20-17 by the 9:19 mark. A three pointer by Tyler Mack and free throws from Hupstead and Elijah Wilson gave UMES a seven point advantage, 26-19, by the 7:40 mark. NCCU responded with a 9-0 run to jump up by two, 28-26 with 5:50 to play in the first half. Johnson broke the Hawk scoring drought with a midrange jumper. Another jumper by Ellis cut the deficit back to one, 31-30, with 3:37 to go in the half. The team's traded buckets down the final stages of the half highlighted by back-to-back dunks by UMES forward Kelechi Okworogwo while NCCU managed five free throws in the final three minutes to take a 40-37 advantage into the locker room.

Okworogwo led the Hawks in the first half with nine points while Johnson recorded seven. NCCU's Fred Cleveland, Jr. led all players with 11 points while the Eagle bench had key contributions with eight points from Timmy Adedire and Ja'Darius Harris.

NCCU extended its lead to seven by the 15:16 mark after a Po'Boigh King make from three point range. King hit again on the next Eagle possession to give NCCU a 54-45 lead. The NCCU lead went up to as many as 11 while the UMES offense went nearly four minutes without a field goal. A Johnson three pointer broke the field goal drought with 12:06 to go. UMES continued to keep the margin to single digits going into the nine minute mark as Ellis converted a three-point play.

Ellis continued to keep the Hawks within striking distance with three straight baskets as UMES trailed by eight, 73-65, with 3:39 left. After a Mack three pointer brought UMES to within seven, Ellis split a pair of free throws on the next possession to narrow the gap, 76-70. After a NCCU free throw, Hupstead converted on a putback to bring the Hawks to within five with under two minutes to go. The Hawks continued to cut into the lead as a Johnson make in transition made it a three point game with just over a minute to go. UMES came up empty on its next two offensive possessions while NCCU added free throws by King, Cleveland and Keishon Porter. A Wilson make and a Okworogwo put back dunk kept the game interesting as UMES trailed 83-79. Two misses by NCCU at the line and a Johnson layin brought UMES to within two with 11 seconds to go. Cleveland drew the foul

and calmly knocked down two from the line to put the Eagles back up by four. Cleveland added two more free throws after a missed UMES shot to give NCCU the six point win.

BY THE NUMBERS

NCCU was an efficient 28 of 36 from the free throw line while UMES made 17 of 26 free throw attempts.

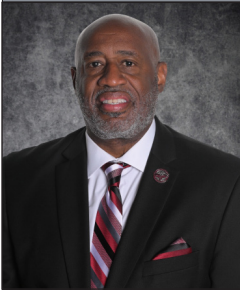
NCCU was paced by Fred Cleveland's 21 points and Po'Boigh King had 17 points in the victory.

Dionte Johnson recorded a new career-high 21 points in the loss. Devon Ellis had 18 points going eight for 10 from the field. Kelechi Okworogwo finished with 13 points.

UMES went into Wednesday's game with their top two scorers in Hupstead and Ellis limited due to injury.

The Hawks had lost the previous two games to NCCU by a combined margin of 51 (L 65-57, L 88-55)





HEAD COACH

Cleo Hill Jr.

1st Year

Cleo Hill, Jr. was named the head men's basketball coach at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore in June of 2024.

A veteran coach, Hill comes to UMES with 17 seasons of head coaching experience along with a variety of assistant coaching roles and an impressive collegiate playing career at North Carolina Central University.

Hill spent the previous six seasons as the head coach of the Rams at Winston-Salem State University.

Last season, Hill led the Rams to a 19-9 overall record along with a perfect 6-0 record in the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association Northern Division. With the top record in the CIAA, the Rams were ranked in the D2CSC Atlantic Poll eight times. Hill developed two All-CIAA selections in Jaylen Alston and Isaac Parson. Alston was also tabbed CIAA Player of the Year. In addition, Imajae Dodd was named CIAA Defensive Player of the Year and Hill earned CIAA Coach of the Year honors. Earlier in May of this year, Hill was selected to coach and hold on-court basketball sessions at the NBA Draft Combine in Chicago, Illinois.

Hill guided the Rams to a 21-9 ledger in 2022-2023 on the way to capturing the CIAA Tournament title and earning an appearance in the NCAA Div. II tournament. Player standouts under Hill's tutelage included CIAA Tournament MVP Jaylen Alston and All-CIAA selection Jaylon Gibson. Hill was also chosen by WSSU Athletic Director Etienne Thomas to participate in Leadership Winston-Salem, a 9-month leadership program designed to educate, connect, and energize leaders to serve and improve the community. At the end of the 2023 season, Hill was named to the North Carolina Black Business Power 100 List.

Despite the most uncertain of times coming out of a canceled 2020-21 season due to Covid-19, the Rams 2021-22 season was unwavering as they clinched a Southern Division title ending the regular season with an 18-7 record while Hill secured his 200th career head coaching victory. Hill helped develop Cameron Campbell and Javante Cooke who both earned All-CIAA selection. Cooke also secured a spot on the HBCU All-Star Team and was ultimately drafted to the G-League.

In his second year as the WSSU head coach, Hill led the team to its first CIAA championship in eight years with a 19-10 overall record. In addition to the team's tournament championship, the Rams also claimed a share of the 2019-20 CIAA Southern Division Championship while Hill was named the CIAA Coach of the Year. The Rams also made their first trip to the NCAA Division II Atlantic Region Tournament since 2013.

Prior to taking the reins of the WSSU program, Hill was an entrepreneur, serving as a basketball trainer for three years including working several basketball camps through Breakthrough Basketball.

Hill spent seven seasons as the head coach at Shaw University from 2008 to 2015. Under Hill's leadership, the Bears went 116-67 overall record. Hill's most successful run with the Bears included the 2011-2012 season in which Shaw went 27-4 overall along with an undefeated regular season in the CIAA with a 16-0 record while earning a Southern Division crown and an NCAA tournament at-large bid. The team advanced to the Atlantic Regional final and concluded the season ranked No. 5 in the nation. During his time as the Shaw head coach, Hill developed CIAA Player of the Year and Atlantic Region Player of the Year Malik Alvin and All-CIAA selection Tony Smith. Hill was also named CIAA Coach of the Year and BOXTOROW Coach of the Year.

On their way to a 23-9 record in 2010-2011, the Bears won the CIAA title while Ra-

heem Smith earned CIAA tournament MVP. Smith along with teammate Tony Smith were selected to the All-CIAA Team. Hill was recognized for his Team's achievements by being named NSAA/NCAA DII Clarence Big House Gaines Coach of the Year and BOXTOROW Coach of the Year.

Hill's head coaching career began at Cheyney University. Serving as the head coach of the Wolves from 2003 to 2008, Hill made an immediate impact. In his first season, the Wolves went 23-8 overall and won the Eastern Division title with a 10-2 record. Hill's Wolves led the conference in scoring with 82 points per game led by East Player of the Year Anthony Frazier.

Before obtaining his first head coach position, Hill spent time as an assistant coach with Shaw University from 2000 to 2002. Hill supported the team as they clinched a CIAA Championship while advancing to the final field of four teams in the NCAA Div. II tournament. In addition, Hill assisted in the development of Ronald "Flip" Murray, who was voted CIAA Player of the year and Division II Player of the Year. Murray went on to be drafted in 2002 as the 42nd overall pick of the Milwaukee Bucks.

From 1998 to 2000, Hill was the assistant coach at the University of Nebraska where the team earned an NIT bid during the 1998-99 season. In addition, Hill's first recruiting class at Nebraska was ranked top 20 in the nation.

Prior to Nebraska, Hill was an assistant coach at Mount Zion Christian Academy in Durham from 1996 to 97, where he helped coach the No. 1 ranked high school player in the country, lottery pick, and future NBA Hall of Fame inductee Tracy McGrady. While at Mount Zion Christian Academy, Hill was part of a team that went 26-3 while being ranked No. 1 in the country.

Hill's first assistant coaching position was at his high school alma mater, Orange High School in Orange, New Jersey from 1991 to 1994. Prior to embarking on his coaching career, Hill played two seasons of semiprofessional basketball overseas.

Hill is a graduate of North Carolina Central University where he earned South Atlantic Region All-Tournament team honors as a senior and is still among the school's all-time leading scorers after eclipsing the 1,000-point milestone in college. Hill was also a standout basketball player at Orange High School from 1980 to 1984 and received multiple basketball honors including All-City, All-County, and All-State honors. He eclipsed 1,000 points scored and ranks among the top ten scorers in school history. He was later inducted into the Orange High School Sports Hall of Fame.

Originally from Orange, New Jersey, Hill is the son of 2017 National Collegiate Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Cleo Hill, Sr., a guard who scored 2,488 points in his career at Winston-Salem State Teacher's College, now Winston-Salem State University. The elder Hill went on to be the eighth overall pick in the 1961 NBA draft by the St. Louis Hawks, the first player from an HBCU taken in the first round.

Hill is married to the former Regina Boone and together they have 3 children, Sage, Cleo Hill III and his oldest daughter Ciara who is a rising sophomore at Winston-Salem State University.

"I am ready for the opportunity to lead our men's basketball program at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore. I appreciate the campus community, President Heidi M. Anderson, Vice President Tara Owens and the search committee for their efforts throughout the hiring process," says Hill. "My past experiences and success as well as my passion for building programs have prepared me for this next step in my coaching career. Our goal is to build Hawk basketball into a perennial championship contender while winning in the classroom and positively representing UMES in the community. I am enthusiastic about the future and look forward to developing a team that our alumni, student body and fans will be proud of."

Hill takes over a UMES program coming off a 9-20 season with a 4-10 mark in conference play.

Lance Beckwith has served as the assistant coach of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore men's basketball program since July of 2024.

Beckwith brings a wealth of basketball experience to UMES. He worked with current UMES head coach Cleo Hill at Winston Salem State as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator from 2018 until Spring 2024.

The Rams experienced an elite run of success during the period that Beckwith was on campus. In five seasons at WSSU, the Rams won 90 games, took home a pair of Southern Division titles, won two Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association (CIAA) championships, and were the victors of the 2022 Gary Miller Classic, 2023 Chris Paul Invitational, and NBA All-Star x HBCU Classic. For their excellence on the hardwood, Beckwith was recognized as a member of the Coaching Staff of the Year alongside the rest of the Winston Salem State coaches in both the 2019-2020 and 2023-2024 seasons.

In addition to wins and accolades on the court, Beckwith has excelled at helping student-athletes reach their full potential. With a special focus on developing guards, Beckwith has coached 12 players who have gone on to play bas-

ketball professionally. In terms of player accolades, two CIAA All-Rookie players, one CIAA Defensive MVP, six HBCU Boxtorow All-Americans, and five straight seasons of CIAA First Team Selections have all developed under Beckwith's tutelage at WSSU.

Before joining the Rams' coaching staff, Beckwith served as a basketball trainer in the Raleigh-Durham area of North Carolina. During his time as a trainer, Beckwith had stints with Team United of the Elite Basketball Youth League (EYBL) and coached Team Wall in the Adidas Gauntlet. He also was the head coach of a 15U basketball team and an assistant coach of a 17U basketball team.

In addition to his coaching background, Beckwith also excelled as a player. He made history at Wake Tech Community College by being the first athlete to sign a basketball scholarship. Beckwith continued his career at the University of Central Missouri where he led the Mules to a pair of Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) regular season championships and a MIAA Tournament crown. During his career, he amassed 1,329 points with 546 rebounds, and 344 assists. In high school, he starred at the Word of God Christian Academy where he won a state title in 2008 and was a teammate of NBA point guard John Wall.

Beckwith graduated in 2013 from the University of Central Missouri with a Bachelor of Science degree. He also holds a Master of the Arts degree in Communications.

Off the court, he and his wife, Chaquinta, are the proud parents of a son, Lance Beckwith, Jr.
